Our Vision

Our Mission

Animal Victory's program is dedicated to providing relief to animals affected by natural disasters or other crises, while also combating overpopulation and advocating for animal rights through various projects or initiatives..

THE PROBLEM:

Animals Are at the Bottom of the List.

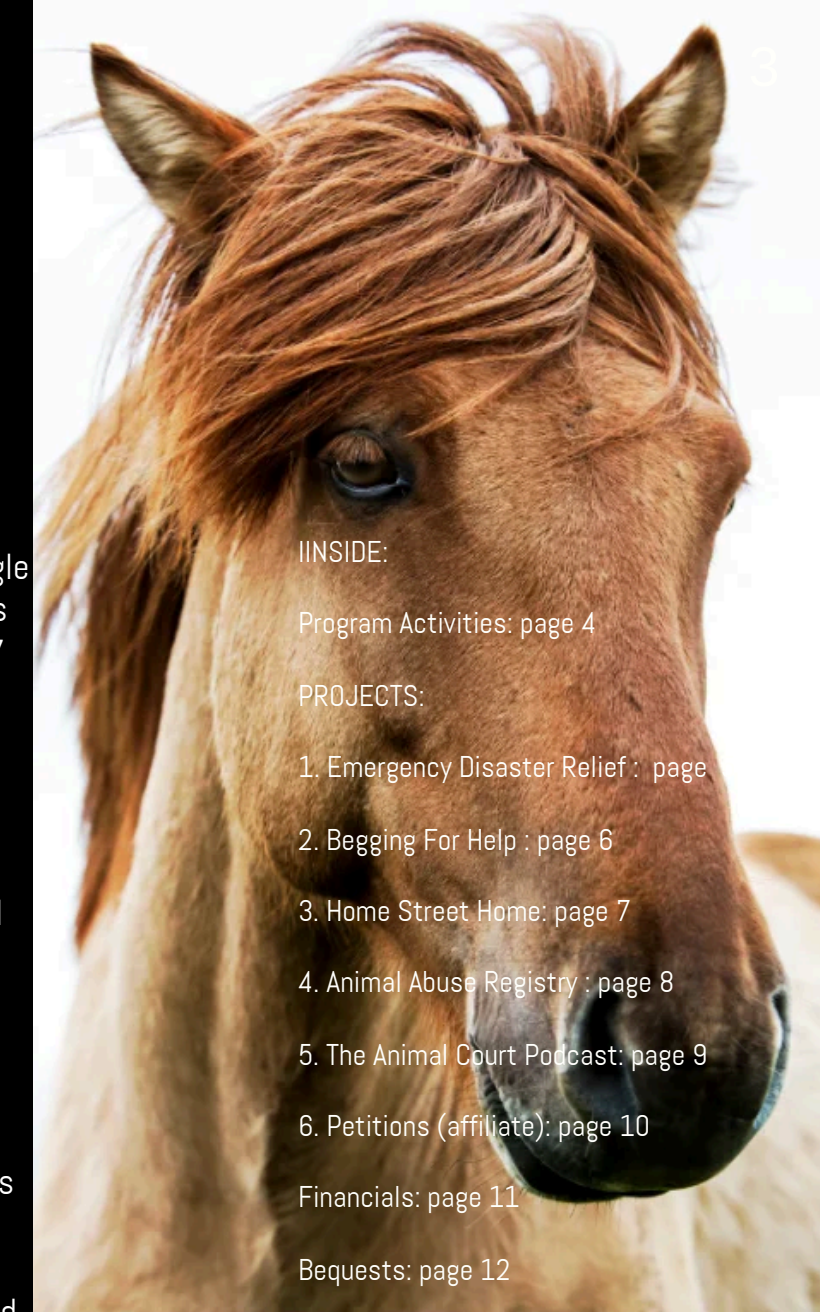
Most people assume animals are well supported by charitable giving. They are not. Giving USA groups animals with the environment in a single category called Environment/Animals, which remains at the bottom. In 2017 Americans gave \$410.02 billion to charity. Environment/Animals received 3 percent or \$11.83 billion. In 2024 total giving rose to \$592.50 billion, but Environment/Animals still received 3 percent or \$21.57 billion. Animals gained dollars but not share.

If split about half, animals get roughly \$10.8 billion, and about 87 percent of that goes to the top 1-5% national organizations. That leaves about \$14 billion for over 25,000 small rescues, shelters, and sanctuaries, about \$56,000 per organization per year, which is not enough to operate. Many small groups are overwhelmed or closing.

These grassroots organizations do the urgent on the ground work: rescue from cruelty, disaster response, medical care, and sheltering animals others will not take. Donors usually give to well known national groups, and those funds rarely reach local rescuers. We identify and vet these boots on the ground groups and direct funds and supplies straight to them so the money reaches the organizations doing the real work.

THE SOLUTION:

Animal Victory Disaster and Abuse Fund is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that builds that bridge. We operate six projects designed to protect animals in crisis and strengthen long-term protections. [Emergency Disaster Relief](#) gets funding and supplies directly to small rescues during hurricanes, wildfires, and other emergencies. [Begging For Help](#) addresses community dog and cat overpopulation through TNR. [Home Street Home](#) supports the pets of unhoused individuals. [The Animal Abuse Registry \(PASS\)](#) is building the first national public database of convicted animal abusers. [The Animal Court Podcast](#) exposes hidden abuse cases weekly. And our Petitions affiliate mobilizes large-scale public pressure for accountability. As of January 2026, we have distributed nearly \$246,000 in funding and supplies and helped an estimated 8,200 animals based upon \$30.00 per animal to the rest of the credible sustainable small rescues, shelters, and individuals doing the hard work.



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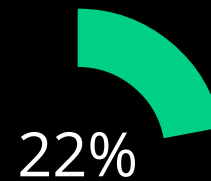

In 2025, our program services benefited approximately 3065 animals based upon \$30.00 per animal. 50% of our program expenses went towards Emergency Disaster Relief, 22% to our Begging For Help project, 20% to our Home Street Home project and 8% to The Animal Court Podcast. These allocations are based on the amount of donations received for each project.





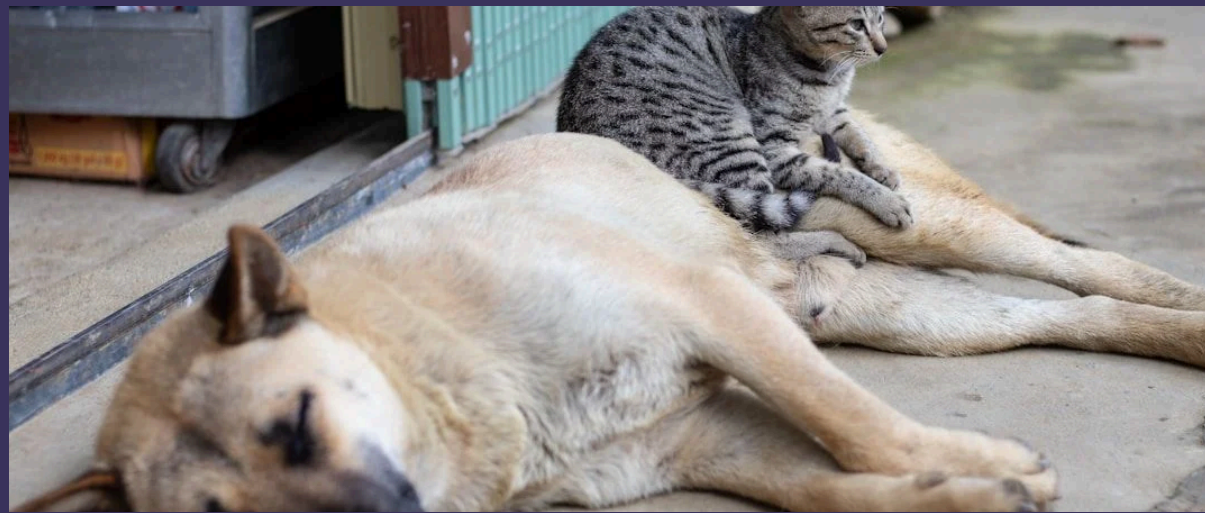
This project is a lifeline for animals caught in the chaos of natural disasters and war zones. Through the concerted efforts of our affiliates and connections in the affected regions, we deploy supplies and funds swiftly and efficiently.

2025 Results:

In 2025 we worked with 12 organizations/individuals and helped approximately 1000 animals

Since the inception of this project we have worked with approximately 50 organizations/individuals assisting over to 5000 animals.

Begging For Help Project



Our distinctive funding initiative provides vital financial assistance for low-cost spay and neuter services for dedicated, sustainable, smaller groups and individuals within the United States who tap into their resources to control the population of cats and dogs in their local communities by spaying or neutering.

The ultimate objective is to maintain a balanced population of these animals. Our initiative contributes to the health and safety of communities and reduces animal cruelty by decreasing the number of stray animals on the streets.

2025 Results:

In 2025, we worked with 14 organizations/ individuals providing low cost spay and neuter services for approximately 300 dogs and cats.



Home Street Home Project



Home Street Home serves dogs and cats belonging to individuals experiencing homelessness. This program is an organized annual effort, particularly active during the November and December holidays, aimed at providing food, supplies, and veterinary care for these pets.

2025 Results:


Distributed 640 Holiday Love Bags in CA, WA, and Greater Kansas City with our affiliates - Taking it to the Streets, Adams County Pet Rescue and Heart of Humane Society

Since the inception of this project in 2020, we distributed the equivalent of 3103 Love Bags

The Animal Victory Disaster & Abuse Fund (AVDAF) is an independent 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization that collaborates with Animal Victory (AnimalVictory.org), a separate, mission-driven for-profit advocacy organization that publishes petitions, raises public awareness, and mobilizes public action on behalf of animals.

AVDAF and Animal Victory may share certain marketing, administrative, and operational resources to reduce costs and increase efficiency. Any shared services or expenses are allocated based on actual use, are reasonable and documented, and are structured to ensure compliance with nonprofit regulations and private benefit rules.

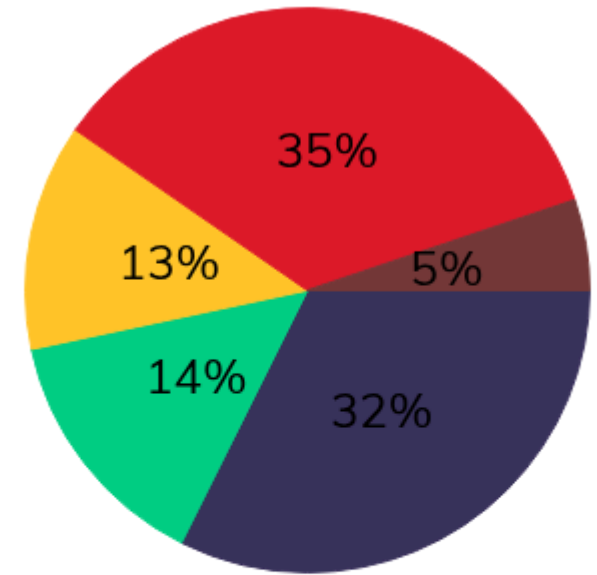


2025 Program Expense Allocation

In 2025, 65% of our total budget was directed to program expenses, while 35% covered operational and fundraising costs.

Of our program expenses, the largest share- 50%- went to Emergency Disaster Relief, reflecting our commitment to supporting animals during times of crisis and disaster. Begging for Help received 22% of program expenses, addressing the critical issue of animal overpopulation. Home Street Home accounted for 20%, dedicated to helping pets of individuals experiencing homelessness find stable housing. The Animal Court Podcast received the remaining 8%, amplifying awareness of animal abuse cases and advocacy efforts.

These allocations are based on the amount of donations received for each project and reflect our organization's mission to protect and support animals in need.
